Impact on Adult Learning

- 4,800+ Seattle residents attended over 400 English language classes in 2017.
- 82 U.S. citizenship classes were held, and 1,300+ people were helped with citizenship applications and interviews.
- 3,000 adults attended workshops or tutoring that helped with job readiness, GED preparation, life skills and more.
- "A Fake News Survival class" was developed to help communities identify misinformation.

Impact on Local Businesses

- Business librarians held 201 meetings held with local entrepreneurs.
- 2,000 people learned how to start a business at 185 Library events, including the fourth annual Startup Weekend.
- 61 community partners enhanced the Library's small business program.

Impact on Student Success

- 11,352 kids and teens learned STEAM skills in the annual Summer of Learning program.
- 8,000 free eclipse glasses were distributed for the much-anticipated solar eclipse in August 2017.
- 69 public elementary schools participated in the 22nd Global Reading Challenge.
- 10 Library locations offered 1,153 Homework Help sessions.
- 2,600+ story times were offered in English, Mandarin, Spanish, Somali, Arabic and Vietnamese.

Impact on People in Need

- 50 Wi-Fi hotspots circulated to more than 150 residents of tent cities, with longer, fourmonth lending periods offering meaningful internet access.
- Services for veterans included help with housing, financial planning, legal issues, access to medical care and more.
- 9,000+ residents received assistance completing income tax returns.

Impact on Cultural & Civic Engagement

- Peak Picks, a new no-holds, nowait collection of popular titles, was piloted in May and expanded systemwide in November.
- Peak Picks titles were checked out 69,000 times in 2017.
- Outreach with community partners helped grow Seattle Reads program attendance by 55 percent from the previous year.
