# Impact on Adult Learning

- Working with Literacy Source, offered English Circle sessions with 268 unique participants who hailed from 26 countries.
- Held Intermediate English
   Pronunciation Classes and
   Intermediate English Vocabulary
   Classes with almost 2,000 attendees.
- In collaboration with community partners, held 73 programs for older adults.
- Partnering with SilverKite, offered 47 virtual arts-related programs for older patrons.

## Impact on Local Businesses

- Met virtually with more than 290 entrepreneurs and small business owners to offer one-on-one support.
- Offered free legal consults with volunteer attorneys to more than 190 people.
- Collaborated with 29 community partners on more than 65 programs and events for small businesses.
- Used the Urban Libraries Council's new Business Value Calculator to calculate the market value of our prior year's (2021) business services at \$4.9 million.

- Students participated in over 3,200 virtual tutoring sessions.
- Restarted weekly in-person Kaleidoscope Play and Learn programs.
- More than 2,900 students from 72 schools across the city competed in the Global Reading Challenge.
- Distributed over 20,000 "Superhero Summer" Summer of Learning action guides.
- Distributed more than 13,000 books to historically underserved youth and families.

### **Expanding Access**

- Maintained open hours at 27 Library locations at 90%+ of pre-pandemic service levels.
- Installed 22 ScanEZ stations
- Loaned 1,270 Wi-Fi hot spots in the community.
- Created an in-house Social Services Team.
- Mobile Services provided monthly visits or deliveries to 25 preschools, 68 adult facilities/buildings and two tiny house villages.

- More than 9,000 people participated in the Seattle Reads program highlighting "The House of Broken Angels," by Luis Alberto Urrea, with in-person events by Urrea.

- Added 1,100+ items to our digital local history and culture collections.
